


Benign Paroxysmal Positional Vertigo (B.P.P.V.)



Degeneration of the salt-like crystals (otoliths) in the utricle which break free and float into or attach to the semicircular canals.

Symptoms include: attacks of vertigo with rapid, pitched head motion in a specific direction. These attacks may be triggered by looking up or down, left or right, rolling over in bed, bending over to tie your shoes or driving/riding in a vehicle.

Treatment Options Include:

- Vestibular Therapy which may include Canalith Repositioning or Semont Liberatory Maneuver
- Desensitization Exercises
- Surgery
